At the Na onal Execu ve Board (NB) mee ng in November, in closed session a mo on was made and seconded to move to referendum the Maryland and Hawaii resolu ons concerning the alloca on of the ballot votes of the eNARFE chapter to the Federa on Presidents where the eNARFE members live. The mo on did not pass. There were no mo ons put forward to agree or disagree with the topic of the resolu ons. Accordingly the resolu ons will proceed towards considera on at the Na onal Conven on in August 2014. More informa on on this ma er as well as some other subjects that were discussed at the NB mee ng can be found in Dick Strombotne's ar cle tled "Na onal Execu ve Board Observa ons"

appearing on page 10 in this newsle er. It is my opinion that Maryland has not wasted our me by pung our October 1 resolu on forward for referendum. While the NB and some federa ons have been aware of this problem, I believe that our acon has resulted in a heightened awareness among the federa ons and will increase the chances of our resolu on or a similar one at the 2014 conven on. In fact, since the NB meeng, a couple more federa ons have indicated their support for the MD resolu on.

While on the subject of resolu ons, it is appropriate to men on that the chapters need to be thinking about addi onal resolu ons that we should submit for the 2014 Conven on. In this regard, I direct your a en on to Resolu ons Commi ee Co-Chair Saj Durrani's "Call for Resolu ons" on page 10 in this newsle er. Saj outlines the metable for processing resolu ons. In addi on, Dick Strombotne's item on "Na onal Bylaws & Standing Rules" is wri en with the inten on of inspiring the chapters to act on developing one or more resolu ons each.

As I was pu ng the nishing touches on this message I received an email from our Regional Vice President (Region II) Evelyn Kirby that Ac ve Federal Employee (AFE) David Kosterlitz of Chapter 258 had been selected by Na onal President Beaudoin for the Future of NARFE (FON) Commi ee Focus Group. Accordingly, I extend my congratula ons to David. I appreciate not only his willingness to serve his fellow NARFE members, but, that of other ne Marylanders who considered serving on FON ac vi es and may not have been selected. I think our Federa on can take pride that we now have three of our members engaged in the FON Commi ee: Evelyn Kirby as Co-Chair, Ted Jensen as a Commi ee member, and now David Kosterlitz as part of the focus group.

The call le er for the Region II Training Symposium in Ge ysburg, Pa., on March 31 and April 1, 2014 was sent out to the MD Federa on Chapter Presidents on November 27, 2013. The MD Federa on will reimburse its chapters for up to two \$75 registra on fees. Please refer to the call le er, for the details, registra on form and deadlines.

FEDERATION LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

ISTHERE A GRAND BARGAIN DEAL OR NOT?

Since the last Maryland Federa on newsle er, your Legisla ve Director/Federal Legisla ve Commi ee has been involved in the following ac vi es: mee ngs with Maryland elected o cials and Congressional representa ves; Congressman Bijah E Cummings' A ordable Care Act Symposium; Congressional Black Caucus Recep on; Congressman **Cummings Dinner Event; Capitol Hill Chained-CPI** Rally with Representa ve Jan Schakowsky (D-IL), Senator Bernie Sanders (D-VT), and others; Maryland State and District of Columbia AFL-CIO 29th Biennial Conven on; Senator Ben Cardin, Congresswoman Donna Edwards, Congressman John Delaney, Congressman John Sarbanes, and Maryland General Assembly Delegates and elected o cials, Maryland/ DC Alliance for Re red Americans Conven on; Chained-OPI White House Rally; Recruitment Re rement Seminar Department of Veterans A airs; Recruitment Social Security Administra on; Recruitment Department of Defense event; Senior Expo; and USPS/NALCRe ree Past President Dinner.

The government shutdown cost the U.S economy a whopping \$24 billion in lost revenue and furloughed over 800,000 federal employees without pay for about two weeks. Congress' failure and irresponsibility to compromise and to reach a deal on the budget, sent people home unpaid, giving workers about four hours to clean out their o ces leaving with no end to the shutdown in sight. Shutdowns are so disrup ve that poli cians rarely resort to them.

The last government shutdown happened about 17 years ago. The majority of Americans did not think it was a good idea for the Congress to shut down the government in the hope of derailing or repealing the A ordable Care Act, which is President Barrack Obama's signature piece of legisla on.

While a ending Representa ve Bijah Cummings' A ordable Care Act (ACA) Symposium on September 14, I had the opportunity to have polite conversa ons with Representa ve John Conyers Jr. (D-MI), Representa ve Robert Sco (D-VA), and Maryland Lieutenant Governor Anthony Brown on the ACA, Chained-CPI and FB-BP. Members of Congress and their personal o ce sta will leave the FB-B and secure their health insurance through the exchanges, but they will con nue to receive their government contribu on.

The scal year ended September 30, but a shortterm con nuing resolu on was passed to maintain funding un I December 15. This agreement was reached on October 16, and signed by President Obama a er midnight to end the government shutdown. The Conference Commi ee will be looking at all areas of de cit reduc on including our concern that the Chained-OPI could be part of any budget deal put on the table. This law extends scal year 2013 funding through January 15, 2014, and requires the House-Senate Conference Commi ee to come up with a budget framework by December 15. Every Representa ve elected to Congress from the great state of Maryland has received a le er from the Maryland Federa on 1st VP/Legisla ve Director staing that over the past three years, the federal community has contributed more than \$114 billion to de cit reduc on. In addi on through both the furlough savings from the sequestra on and increases in contribu ons of federal employees hired a er January 1, 2013 addi onal savings of an es mated \$15 billion resulted.

In dosing I would like to share with you a recent message from Jessie Klement, Legisla ve Director at NARFEs Na onal O ce to NARFE leaders in Budget Commi ee states - "As you probably heard by now, Senator Pa y Murray (D-WA) and Representa ve Paul Ryan (R-WI) reached an agreement this week on the 2014 and 2015 budget. Before I dive into par culars, I wanted to thank you for your hard work reaching out to members of the budget conference commi ee. During the past two months, we saw many legislators come out against the idea of targe ng federal employees. We believe that it was because of your outreach that these legislators took such a strong stance and kept current employees out of the agreement. As such, it is no longer necessary for you to contact your members of Congress on the budget deal.

Leading up to the announcement, there was heavy specula on that the agreement would include an increase in re rement contribu ons to ac ve employees. Thanks to the strong advocacy by several legislators on the commi ee, as well as the en re federal community, that proposal was not included. However, the agreement does include a 1.3 new or returning purchasers. The chief House percent increase in regreement contributions for new hires star ng next year. These individuals will now be contribu ng 4.4 percent of their salary towards re rement, without an increase in bene t. Also included in the agreement is the addi on of a "self plus one" op on to the Federal Employees Health Bene t Program (FEHBP). OPM will establish a meline for this new op on but it could be available as early as the 2014 open season.

This is a two-year budget agreement and will o set some sequestra on cuts for the next two years. It will be up to the appropria ons commi ees to determine exactly which cuts will be avoided, but there should not be furloughs in 2014 and 2015. Thank you again for all of your hard work."

STATE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE (SLC)) **REPORT**

2014 LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM PAMPHLET

The 2014 legisla ve pamphlet was nalized in November and emailed to Execu ve Board Members, Chapter Presidents, Commi ee Chairs, and State Legisla ve contacts. The pamphlet was posted on the Federa on's website at the same me (h p:// www.mdnarfe.org/2014Legisla vePamphlet.pdf).

I encourage all to look at the complete document, if you have not already done so. BILLS

The SLC is introducing companion bills in the 2014 General Assembly session for the purchase and reten on of Long-Term Care (LTC) insurance. The bills would annualize the present one- me \$500 tax credit in two \$250 phases for tax years 2015 and 2016, then \$500 for 2017 and annually therea er for sponsor is Delegate Jm Hubbard (D-District 23). The chief Senate sponsor is Senator Kathy Klausmeier (D-District 8). You are asked to contact your senators and delegates reques ing that they support these bills.

A new ini a ve for 2014 is to equalize the tax subtrac on from income for public service re rees and military re rees. At the present me, military re rees receive a \$5,000 subtrac on from pension income. We propose to equalize the \$5,000 subtrac on from income for public service re rees and increase the amount of the subtrac on to \$10,000, for both military and public service re rees age 65 or older in phases beginning in 2015. At this me, we are seeking sponsors.

REACHING OUT

In prepara on for the 2014 session, members of the SLChave met with various people to exchange informa on about NARFE and seek support for our legisla ve ac vi es. On July 23, Ed Bice and Chuck Thomas met with Senator Kasemeyer, Chair, Senate Budget and Tax Commi ee and legisla ve analyst Ma Benne . Bill Ferguson, Gary Roundtree and Ed (con nued on page 6)

Bice met with Peter Baron from Speaker Busch's sta on August 23. Bill, Gary and Ed met with David Stoan from Governor O'Malley's o ce on September 3. In November, addi onal mee ngs took place, seeking support for SLC issues. Dick Strombotne, Bill and myself meet with Robert Rehrmann, a principal analyst with the Department of Legisla ve Services on November 5 for a discussion of the LTC insurance bills. On November 7, Dick, Joe Young and myself met in an hour-long mee ng with Delegate Sheila Hixson, Chair, House Ways and Means Commi ee, in a discussion of our issues. Let me thank all the members of the SLC for their support in prepara on for the upcoming legisla ve session. INCENTIVE

The SLC is again o ering to pay for parking at the Navy-Marine Corps Stadium (\$5) to any NARFE member who a ends a hearing in Annapolis, when our supported bills are heard in commi ee. In addi on, any chapter that has three or more of the chapter members a ending a bill hearing at the same me will receive \$35.

MD-PAC COMMITTEE UPDATE

The State Legisla ve Commi ee has been hard at work this past fall upda ng our proposed Legisla ve Agenda for the upcoming session of the Maryland General Assembly. The state of the Maryland budget and the elec on cycle for our Maryland State public o cials were some of the more important factors considered.

For the rst me in a number of years our Governor and state legislators cannot dismiss out-of-hand any legisla on that either reduces revenue or increases costs based upon the state of the budget. Years of raising taxes, fees, etc., and a rebounding Maryland economy have made that argument moot. Our legislators will also be more inclined to listen to their const uents this year since 2014 is an electon year for all of our State representatives. Anything they do during the upcoming session will surely be

used by either them to tout the good they have done or their opponents to tout the bad they have done. Thus, we have an opportunity to clearly in uence our legislators by presen ng our agenda for legisla on this year. We need to back up this presenta on with a promise of our membership being behind this and that they are prepared to vote according to these issues. Legislators know that some groups such as the NRA are basically single-issue groups and that their members will vote according to how they legislate on the issue of concern, no ma er how they vote on other issues. NARFE is not a single-issue organiza on. We have an agenda that will help all seniors in general and re red federal employees in par cular. Our agenda will also be good for the State of Maryland, allowing it to be er compete with states, such as North Carolina and Pennsylvania, for senior dollars and volunteers.

Our legisla ve agenda includes an increase in the exclusion of income for public employee and military pensions of \$10,000. It includes tax credits for long-term care, reduced real estate taxes for seniors based upon need equaliza on of the senior exemp on. One of the best ways for us to make our posi on known to our legislators is through our support of them via the Maryland NARFE PAC (MD-PAC).

The PAC receives requests from legislators for monetary support via a endance at fundraising events. The Poli cal Ac on Commi ee gets input from the chapters from the legislator's district and then votes on support or no support. For those that we support we have members of the State Legisla ve Commi ee as well as NARFE o cers or members from the legislator's district a end these events. Not only do we have the opportunity to make our case to the legislator, but in addi on to all of the other legislators who a end the event and also to the other lobbyists and groups that are a ending. Thus the money contributed to the PAC gives voice to the NARFE Legisla ve Agenda for the state.

The period between now and next November is crucial. We need to make an all out e ort to get our legisla on passed now and if not to show through our e orts that we will only support those legislators for re-elec on that support us. In addi on to each member calling or wri ng their legislator, they can make a dona on to the PAC and reinforce our

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contacts with the legislators. Remember a er next November it will be four years before our legislators will face re-elec on. Act now. Donate now. MEMBERSHIP UPDATE

The dedine in membership numbers has consistently slowed each month of this year. This gives us renewed hope and vigor to work hard at raising the membership numbers even higher within the Maryland Federa on.

The Federa on and Chapter members have jointly par cipated in many events this fall, informing federal re rees and ac ve employees of the many reasons they need to join NARFE. We have a ended func ons within the federal workplace such as the Veteran's Associa ons, Social Security Administra on, Defense Informa on Systems Agency, Postal O ces events, and 50+ Expos in Bal more, Sliver Spring and Columbia. Chapter members represented us at the FEHB mee ngs held in various loca ons as well as numerous community events. I plan to keep in close contact with the chapter presidents and membership chairs to hear their ideas, sugges ons and comments for increasing our membership. Due to sugges ons from the chapters, I am working on a policy to present to the Federa on president that will make it more equitable for chapters to par cipate in ac vi es in their

MEMBERSHIP RETENTION COMMITTEE REPORT

Chapter o cers are well aware of NARFE's declining membership numbers. It is a rare chapter that has experienced any increase in the number of members in recent years, other than by merging with another chapter. For Maryland NARFE, the number of vo ng members has dropped 20 percent since January 2011. There are several reasons for this decline.

First is the fact that the number of new members recruited into NARFE has dropped signicantly. In the 32 months since March 2011 through October 2013, the number of new members recruited into NARFE totaled 34,817. It looks like a large number but it is 40 percent fewer than the number of new members in the comparable period from March 2008 through October 2010. (The increase in na onal dues went into elect in March 2011.) Moreover, many of the new members recently recruited went into the new eNARFE Chapter 2363, which was established in March 2011 and now has 20,000 members (with about 8 percent of them living in Maryland). NARFE Headquarters has made recruitment into eNARFE Chapter 2363 a high

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priority. By de ni on, members recruited into the eNARFE chapter are not members of local chapters.

Second is the fact that too many members do not renew their memberships in NARFE. There are several things that chapter o cers can do to help slow the decline in membership and eventually reverse it to start increasing total membership. The most important thing is to keep the current members of chapters and to reach out to the lapsed members who have not renewed their membership in NARFE. See below for more on this point.

Third is the fact that every year signicant numbers of NARFE members die, as expected in a popula on of elderly people. There is nothing that can be done about this. Some of the deaths are reported but there are many unreported. Early in 2013, NARFE Headquarters dropped from the rolls of Life Members and Honorary Members the names of several thousand previously unreported deceased members. The number of them in Maryland is es mated at 317.

Dues Withholding. Since February 2011, the start of Maryland NARFE's monthly mailings o ering rebates to members in certain groups who sign up for dues withholding, there have been 413 members who have signed up for dues withholding through November 28, 2013. Of these, 133 have received rebates from Maryland NARFE Despite this success, increasing the number of members on dues withholding is like running on a treadmill because older members die even as newer members are added. Speci cally, in May 2011, a er the rst mailing of the DWIP rebate o ers to rst-me members, the total number of members on dues withholding was 2,309 in Maryland. Thirty months later, in October 2013, there were 2,332. Since 413 members were added to the dues withholding rolls it follows that 390 had died, for a change of -16.9 percent or an average annual rate of minus 6.8 percent due to deaths.

By ge ng current re ree members to sign up for dues withholding by describing the bene ts of lower costs, no hassle with membership renewal, and never risking being dropped for non-renewal, chapter o cers will be giving their chapter members useful service. This can be borne out by asking for a show of hands of those on dues withholding at future chapter mee ngs. It can be facilitated by poin ng out the

Dues Withholding applica on form in each issue of narfe magazine behind the new member applica on (h p://www.narfe.org/pdf/

DW NewMembers Re rees.pdf).

In Maryland, about 17 percent of eligible members are on dues withholding, a rate that is comparable with the neighboring Virginia Federa on. The rate for all of NARFE is about 29 percent. Also see the front-page ar de on dues withholding by Bridget Boel in the recent issue of the Recruitment and Reten on Journal for further ideas.

Lapsed Members. Recall that Headquarters (HQ) sends several renewal no ces to members. The rst is sent about nine weeks before a member's expira on date. The second is sent a few days before the expira on date. Three months a er the expira on date, the non-renewing members receive a copy of narfe magazine with a cover wrap stangthat this is the last issue they will receive. They are listed as non-renewing members in membership records at this me. Most members respond to one of these renewal no ces. Many respond promptly a er receiving the cover wrap no ce. NARE sends two more renewal no ces two months and four months a er the cover wrap no ce.

A good me for reten on o cers of chapters to contact their non-renewing members about rejoining would be one month a er they receive the cover wrap no ce. The Online Ac vity Module (OAM) on the NARFE website for use by chapter o cers makes it very easy to iden fy the dropped members. This database is updated daily. By delaying for one month contac ng those listed as dropped, some me a er the 15th of the month, those who promptly responded would not be on the list of non-renewing members and would not have to be contacted. Members nd it annoying to be asked to renew their membership a er they already have done so.

As reported in previous issues of the newsle er, Maryland NARFE sends monthly mailings to lapsed members; they include a personalized le er from the Federa on President asking a member who has not renewed to reac vate his membership in NARFE. These mailings go out six months a er the member is reported as not renewing, that is, a er the usual renewal process by Headquarters has been completed. The posi ve response rate for these

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le ers is more than 7 percent. Further, NARFE Headquarters has been contac ng lapsed members with expira ons more than a year old by mail, email, and phone and has been successful in ge ng many to rejoin, but mainly going into eNARFE Chapter 2363.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The accompanying table reports revenues and expenditures for Maryland NARFE through November 30, 2013. Revenues exceed \$75,000. They are mainly from the 10 percent fund revenues from NARFE Headquarters required by the Na onal Bylaws, as supplemented by revenues from the State Conven on in May and per capita remi ances from all but a few chapters that are due by the end of December, plus lesser revenues.

Expenditures through the end of November exceed \$87,700, resul ng in a current de cit of \$12,300 or so. By the end of the year the de cit is expected to shrink to about \$7,000 to \$7,500, which should be compared to the projected de cit of \$10,150 when the budget was approved in February. By the end of the year, total assets should be about \$77,000, including four Cer cates of Deposit worth \$35,480.

Not included in the 2013 report are expenditures for the remainder of a contract for a social media consultant to assist Maryland NARFE with membership recruitment and outreach. The total contract is for \$5,500 and NARFE Headquarters prepaid matching funds of \$2,750; total billings through the end of November are \$2,294.

REGION II UPDATE

As this year ends, we look to 2014 with high hopes. On the bright side, I salute the Maryland Legisla ve Commi ees as they relessly advocate and rally others to join them. I applaud the spirited representa on and outreach across Maryland at agency and community events where NARFE speakers and recruiters highlight the value of NARFE and urge folks to sign up. NATIONAL BYLAWS & STANDING RULES

Dick Strombotne Maryland NARFE Treasurer & Past President

Next year the delegates to the Na onal Conven on will be considering a number of changes to the Na onal Bylaws. Some will come from the commi ee reviewing the conformity of the bylaws to the DC statute governing nonpro t corpora ons. Others will come from chapters. Maryland NARFE has already submi ed a proposed amendment that would allocate the ballot votes of the eNARFE chapter to the presidents of federa ons where the eNARFE chapter members live. Chapters will have only a few months to consider and submit resolu ons to amend the bylaws and change policies and procedures of NARFE The deadline for subming resolutions to Federa on Secretary Pat Farmer is March 6, 2014. They will be acted on at the Mini-Conven on May 5 and 6 a er review by the Resolu ons Commi ee.

Here are a few sugges ons and comments regarding NARFE's Bylaws and Standing Rules. They are based primarily on my review of the 2012 Bylaws as adopted at the 2012 Na onal Conven on. This is not intended to be a complete overview. For the most part, ac ons are proposed without providing ra onales. References to the Bylaws take the form I.4.D while references to the Standing Rules take the form RI.D.1.

Bylaws

 Add Bylaw specifying procedure for amending Ar des of Incorpora on.

- Broaden eligibility for membership to include holders of TSP accounts.
- In I.4.D, add statement that a member is reinstated upon payment of current na onal and chapter dues.
- Add 5-year membership for payment of four years na onal dues and average chapter dues. Chapters will receive average chapter dues in four annual installments.
- 5. Term limits. II.1.C.1 & 2 are contradictory. Delete "consecu ve" from term limit for president. Add prospec ve three term limit for other NROs. Clarify intent of II.1.C.2 regarding elec on of person who has held the Presidency for more than one year.
- Du es of O cers listed in Rules should be restored to Bylaws.
- 7. Specify that NROs and RVPs are ex-o dio members of NB.
- 8. Specify procedures for federa on presidents in a region to II a vacancy in the RVP o ce.
- 9. Add three "Members at large" to the NB, to be elected at Na onal Conven on for a two-year term by ballot votes of all chapters.
- 10. In Ar de IV, de ne "District" as a possible subdivision of a federa on.
- 11. Require minutes of NB mee ngs to be published in narfe magazine, not just an "o cial publica on," so they can be read by all NARE members.
- 12. Permit adjacent Federa ons to merge by mutual agreement.
- 13. Review language, which states "ac ons by a federa on shall be advisory only upon the chapters ..." Is it s II needed?
- 14. In IV.5.F, how are chapter dues of an Associate Member assessed?
- In V.2, delete the requirement for annual mee ngs of Federa on Presidents.
- 16. In V.1.B2.b.6, restore the speciet language regarding ballot voing on changes in naional dues from the 2010 Bylaws.
- 17. In Ar de VI, Indemni ca on, the language is too broad. It should include addi onal limits.
- 18. In VIII.2.B, permit amendments to the Bylaws to take e ect at a me speci ed in the

- Bylaw language itself.
- 19. In VIII.1, delete authority of a special commi ee designated by the N⊞ to propose Bylaws amendments. This delega on of a Board power is prohibited by DC statute.
- 20. In VIII.4, change referendum condi on from 10 percent of chapters to 50 percent of members. What is the vo ng procedure for chapters when vo ng on a referendum?
- 21. Add requirement for na onal dues to be adjusted to the nearest whole dollar every four years based on the past four COLAs, without further ac on by the members or the NEB. First adjustment to take place in 2015 based on COLAs for 2011 through 2015

Standing Rules

- 1. In RI.1.D, current language regarding Na onal Life Only Members is unenforceable.
- 2. Restore to the Bylaws the right of a member to belong to any chapter (RI.2.A.1).
- 3. In RI.2.C, change the amount remi ed to a chapter for any new member to \$10 from 1/3 of na onal dues.
- 4. RI.4 does not re ect current prac ce in the OAM regarding membership lists and labels.
- 5. Restore to the Bylaws the requirement to publish an o cial publica on that each member can receive (RI.5). There is a con ict with III.3.C.
- Du es of O cers. Restore to Bylaws.
- 7. Na onal Conven on commi ees. President appoints members but NB is charged with regional representa on. The responsibili es are inconsistent. (RV.3.B.1 & 2)

ALZHEMER'SAND LUPUS

Every Chapter should have an Alzheimer's Coordinator. A copy of the Chapter Alzheimer's Coordinator's Manual can be downloaded from the Na onal NARFE website. This is a handy tool you can

resolu on proposing the amendment or in the use to help you get your collections sent in correctly, with no problems. It is an easy procedure to follow.

> Chapter members can make a tax-deduc ble contribu on to support Alzheimer's research. Checks should be made payable to "NARFE Alzheimer's Research" and given to the chapter Alzheimer's coordinator. The chapter will then forward it to the Federa on Alzheimer's Chairman Barbara Jacobs who sends all dona ons/gi sto the Alzheimer's Associa on in Chicago to be included in NARFE's Fund. This procedure ensures that both the chapter and the Federa on will have accurate records of dona ons. and enables the Alzheimer's Associa on to process the dona one quickly and e ciently.

You will receive an acknowledgement for tax deduc on; however, your checks must have a name and address in order to receive an acknowledgment from the Alzheimer's Associa on.

Memorial gi s should also be sent through the chapter coordinator to the Federa on Chairman, as above. The Federa on Chairman (not the Alzheimer's Associa on) will send an acknowledgment of the dona on to the family of the deceased, upon request. Anyone can make a memorial or honor gi to the NARFE Alzheimer's Fund, including non-members.

Chapter o cers with gues on about how the program operates (handling dona ons, memorial gi s and acknowledgments, or ordering materials for special events) may contact me and I will do my best to help you.

For the Lupus dona ons, just send your checks to me, the MD Federa on Lupus Chairman, and I will put a cover le er with them and send them in.

8. In RV.3.B.6, change "na onal headquarters" to History of NARFE's Involvement with Alzheimer's Disease

> NARFE members have played a role in seeking a cure for Alzheimer's Disease since 1985. NARFE supported Alzheimer's Disease Research o cially at the New Mexico Federa on of Chapters Board Mee ng on June 11, 1983. The New Mexico Federa on was the rst NARFE contributor to Alzheimer's Research.

> In 1985-86, the NARFENa onal Execu ve Board approved funding Alzheimer's Disease through contribu ons from chapters. The goal of \$500,000

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for Alzheimer's Research grants was set. President Lud Andolsek's memo to all State Federa ons stated that: each Federa on President appoint a State Coordinator and each chapter appoint an Alzheimer's Chair.

In 1987-88 the rst Na onal Alzheimer's/NARFE Control Commi ee was appointed. The rst mee ng of the Control Commi ee was held with ten members the delega on a new goal of \$10 million by each represen ng their Region. The rst \$500,000 check was presented to the Alzheimer's Associa on in 1988. The rst research grant sponsored by NARFE was awarded in 1988.

The years from 1988-1991 proved successful in raising funds for Alzheimer's Research grants. The rst million dollars included all the funds raised since 1985. At this me, NARFEwas commi ed to the Alzheimer's Research program and began the serious business of se ng goals to a ain more dollars for research.

In 1991, NARFE signed on with the Zenith Fellows Program, the Alzheimer's Associa on most dis nguished donor program. A pledge was made to raise \$1 million in 10 years. This goal was met in less than ve years (August 1995). The research grants selected by NARFE con nue to grow each year as new goals are set.

In 1995, another goal was set called "Target 2000" - contribute another \$1 million by the year 2000.

In September of 1998, a worthy goal of \$5 million by 2005 was established with a unanimous vote by the delegates at the Na onal Conven on in Orlando, Horida. This goal made history with comple on in June 2003 - 2 1/2 years ahead of schedule.

In 2003, a new goal of \$7 million was recommended by the Na onal Commi ee at their 2003 Annual Mee ng. That goal was met in July 2007.

In 2006 during the Na onal Conven on in Albuquerque, New Mexico, with the Commi ee's an cipa on that the \$7 million would be met in 2007, they recommended to the conven on delega on that a new goal be set at \$8 million with no slogan or me frame. The delega on approved. The \$8 million goal was met in February 2009.

In 2008 during the Na onal Conven on in Louisville, Kentucky, again with the Commi ee's an cipa on that the \$8 million goal would be met before the 2010 Na onal Conven on, the commi ee

recommended to the conven on delega on a new goal of "\$9 million by NARFEs 90th Birthday." Again the delega on wholeheartedly approved. The \$9 million goal was met during the rst month of 2011. Members raised the \$1 million in 23 months.

In 2010 during the Na onal Conven on in Grand Rapids, Michigan, the commi ee recommended to 2012. Again the delega on approved.

In 2012 during the Na onal Conven on in Reno-Sparks, Nevada, with the Associa on's goal of raising \$10 million in 2012 within reach, Jane Rodgers, chair of the NARFE-Alzheimer's Na onal Commi ee, gained overwhelming approval from delegates for a new na onal goal of \$11 million in 2014. The \$10 million was met in November 2012.

As of Sept. 30, 2013 the NARFE fundraising total is \$10,501,105.98.

As of Oct. 10, 3012 NARFE has funded a total of 60 researchers since the program was o cially started in 1985.

The Federa on and I thank all chapters that do contribute, and I want to stress to you how important it is for all chapters to par cipate in giving contribu ons to Alzheimer's and Lupus.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

In regard to Federa on business, I have been busy sending out call le ers, training seminar informa on; forwarding resolu ons to Headquarters; sending other informa onal emails; and responding to members' queries. I want to remind you to let me know of any Directory changes I need to make concerning your chapters and don't forget to keep your F-7 informa on up to date as informa on changes in your organiza on. I also want to thank each of you for your pa ence as I took over the job of Federa on Secretary.

You may or may not know that when Ted Jensen was Federa on President, he asked me to join the Maryland Gerontological Associa on (MGA) Board as the representa ve of the Maryland Federa on of NARFE Chapters, replacing Frank Chase. I con nue to serve on that board, currently as its Membership Chair. My main contribu on to the MGA has been the crea on of a three-panel membership brochure to publicize the organiza on and to recruit new members. I have also been involved in the planning for some networking breakfasts and in upda ng the bylaws.

MGA is a mul disciplinary organiza on of professionals and advocates in the eld of aging, dedicated to training and suppor ng people working with older adults and their caregivers. I consider myself a "lay person" on this board because I am not a professional in the eld of aging. I am aging and am concerned about the future of older adults, so I consider myself an advocate for seniors and their future.

The MGA o ers educa onal events, such as its annual Spring Conference on Aging, which o ers access to the latest trends, research and policies in aging; and peer contact through Networking Breakfasts and Forums. Previous educa onal topics have included "Care Transi ons;" "Health Reform;" "The Demen a Journey;" "Hoarding;" and "Aging in Place."

Save the date for the 2014 MGA annual Spring Conference – Wednesday, June 4, 2014 at the Charlestown Re rement Community, in Catonsville. I will provide more details at a later me. Go to www.mdgerontology.org for more informa on on MGA.

Another form that my advocacy for seniors takes is that I write the "Senior Ordes" column for the Howard County Times twice a month and use this venue to pass on informa on of importance to seniors and to highlight seniors and their accomplishments in the community. In the last few months, I have covered telephone scams perpetrated against seniors. I am sure all of you have been receiving these robocalls targeted at seniors; some are about a life-saving alert bracelet, some are about the \$3,000 worth of grocery coupons seniors are eligible for. I also wrote about a solu on to these unwanted robocalls, which might work for you and I am passing the informa on on.

Check out the website for NOMOROBO (No More Robocalls), h p://www.nomorobo.com. Nomorobo is a free service to stop robocalls. It works by using "simultaneous ringing." When someone calls your phone, Nomorobo is able to instantly screen the call for you. If it is a robocaller, Nomorobo answers and immediately hangs up. The only thing that you will hear is a single ring on your phone.

Once you have enabled and veri ed Nomorobo on your phone, use your phone like normal. If you only hear one ring and then it stops, you know a robocaller was just blocked. If the phone con nues ringing, you should answer it.

I enabled NOMOROBO on our home phone and IT WORKS! When I was home sick recently, the phone rang and on the TV screen (caller ID), I saw "senior wc" and an out of area phone number. The phone only rang once. Less than a minute later, the phone rang again and the screen showed "senior alert" with another out of area phone number. Again, the phone only rang once. Try it and see if it works for you. If it doesn't, contact your phone provider. You may have to install simultaneous ringing.

The only numbers that are blocked are reported, illegal robocallers. Your doctor's o ce, prescrip on reminders, weather advisories, etc., will not be

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blocked. Nomorobo isn't blocking poli cal and charity calls yet.

A robocaller or a telemarketer will occasionally slip through. They keep changing their tac cs and Nomorobo keeps adap ng. If a robocall does come through on your phone, report it at h p://www.nomorobo.com/report/create.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD OBSERVATIONS

Dick Strombotne, Treasurer

President Dan McGrath and I a ended the Na onal Execu ve Board (NB) mee ng in Alexandria, VA, on November 19 and 20, along with Jackie Lowe of the DC Federa on and a few other observers. Dan McGrath a ended the full two days; I was only able to a end un I noon on November 20. These are personal observa ons and comments, not an o cial record.

On Thursday, November 21, the NB went into execu ve session to discuss bylaws amendments submi ed by the Maryland and Hawaii Federa ons regarding the alloca on of the ballot votes of the eNARFE Chapter to the presidents of federa ons where the eNARFE chapter members live. Region II Vice President Evelyn Kirby subsequently reported that her mo on to send the Maryland proposal to a referendum vote of the chapters did not meet the requirement for approval by the NB by a two-thirds vote (10-4). So, there will be no referendum vo ng on it. It has been submi ed for considera on at the 2014 Na onal Conven on where the delegates can act on it. It seems likely that the eNARFE Chapter President will be able to cast 10 percent or more of the ballot votes at that me.

The Wednesday morning session was wholly devoted to discussing the Membership Strategic Plan for 2014 in great detail along with other membership ma ers. Secretary Baine Hughes led the presenta on and Membership Marke ng Director Bridget Boel provided details. The full presenta on has been posted on the NARFE website (h p://www.narfe.org/

pdf/2014 Update Strategic Plan PowerPoint.pdf). It appears to this observer that the main recruitment and reten on e orts by NARFEHQ are directed to

increase the number of eNARTE members. As of Tuesday morning, November 19, 2013, eNARTE Chapter 2363 had 19,265 members, 8.2 percent of NARTEs vo ng members. The rou ne dues renewal mailings to members seem to be the primary ac vity by HQ to retain members in local chapters. (A notable excep on is Briget Boel's excellent, front page ar de on dues withholding in the Recrui ng & Reten on Journal for July through September 2013. Here is the link: https://www.narfe.org/pdf/ RRJ 112013.pdf.)

Following the shutdown of the Federal Government early in October 2013, the Headquarters sta developed and rolled out an o er of free sixmonth memberships in NARFE, eChapter 2363 only, for current federal employees, un I December 9, 2013. More than 1,700 new members came into eNARFE Chapter 2363 by November 19. Some of them will become dues paying members when the six -month memberships expire and those who don't will be retained on NARFE's prospec ve members lis ng. HQ will take special ac onsintended to convert these new members to dues paying members. These sixmonth members arguably will not have vo ng rights as they did not pay na onal dues as required of Regular Members and cannot be counted in the determina on next spring of the ballot votes of eNARFE Chapter 2363 for the 2014 Na onal Conven on.

Bridget Boel explained that tes ng of recruitment le ers in the semi-annual OPM blind mailings o ering various op ons for membership had useful results, as follows. The response rate to le ers o ering both eNARFE and local chapter membership was signi cantly less than the response rate for le ers o ering eNARFE only. In a comparison of the response rates for le ers o ering eNARFE membership vs. local chapter membership for the iden cal same \$40 membership fee, the eNARFE le ers won, in early tes ng. Bridget Boel clearly favors sending only le ers o ering eNARFE chapter membership in future OPM blind mailings as the most e ec ve way to increase overall membership in NARFE. However, this will remove a major source of new members to local chapters. See the Membership Reten on report in this issue for further discussion.

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On Tuesday, November 19, Bill Shackelford, who is the Chairman of the Bylaws Review Commi ee and a past president of the VA Federa on, reported on the status of the commi ee's review of Na onal Bylaws approved at the 2012 conven on in light of the DC statute governing nonpro t corpora on - that means NARFE He said that there are three provisions in the bylaws that must be changed, without going into detail, and other changes in the bylaws and rules that the commi ee believes would be advisable. The commi ee will put its recommenda ons in the form of proposed amendments. He noted that the proposed amendments would be footnoted to iden fy the speci c parts of the DC statute that supports the amendments. This will be done to show that the amendments should not be modi ed willynilly in the future. There was no decision about how to o er the proposed amendments.

Legisla ve Director Jessica Klement reported on accomplishments and the legisla ve outlook. The most important accomplishment was the preven on of bad things happening to re ree bene ts. Her o ce has to respond to events in Congress as they are happening, while keeping track of bills introduced to reduce bene ts and a few to make things be er. For example, she reported that a bill addressing premium conversion will be introduced – a good thing. She reported on NARFE's frui ul involvement and leadership with coali ons. All of NARFE's recommenda ons to the O ce of Personnel Management (OPM) regarding the proposed regula ons on Congressional stagoing into health care exchanges under the A ordable Care Act were adopted in the nal rule. The Legisla ve Department is gearing up for 2014 as an elec on year by upda ng the Protect America's Heartbeat campaign.

The budget approved for 2014 shows more than \$11 million in projected revenues and expenditures, with a slight surplus expected. Na onal Treasurer Richard Thissen expects a small surplus for the current year.

A er lengthy discussion, the NB approved a mo on for a small scale test of video streaming at the 2014 Na onal Conven on, expanded tes ng at the 2016 conven on, and full scale coverage at the 2018 conven on, possibly to include online vo ng by registered delegates. Vice President Paul Carew

Ed Wurmb, of Hagerstown, died Aug. 17, 2013 at his home. Born Sept. 29, 1941 in Pi sburgh, Pa., Ed was almost 72.

A er gradua on from Penn Technical instute in 1960, Ed went to work for the Department of Defense. While working, Ed a ended Johns Hopkins University. With 35 years of federal service, with deployments overseas, he re red from the Na onal Security Agency (NSA) in 1991.

How did he get the organiza on started? Ed got out the yellow pages, looked for possible partners and then made the necessary contacts. I always appreciated his a endance at our mee ngs, even when he was receiving medical treatment. I was amazed that Ed would always be in the mee ng room when we arrived and greet us with his smile. Ed was an outstanding leader with a persuasive personality and a person of many talents and achievements and someone who loved his family dearly."
