LEGISLATIVE REPORT





Throughout our Federal careers we have worked with Teams, because we know the value of a TEAM - Together Everyone Achieves More. That is why our Federation President Dr. Gary Roundtree Sr. and I are meeting with your Chapter members to listen, empower, motivate and nurture every member as part of our wider TEAM. We have had exciting interactions with members at the Chapters we have already met and are eager to join forces with the rest. These visits provide us an insight into how chapter members, who are not likely to participate in Federation Board meetings, Training or Conferences, think and how they value their membership in NARFE and our Federation. The data we gather from these meetings, highlighting what is working in the Federation; identifying and developing initiatives and policies; redefining responsibilities, goals and operating plans; and building a more effective TEAM; will be brought to the Federation's decision makers and also to inform NARFE National leaders.



STATE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE (SLC) REPORT

Redistribution of wealth ordinarily refers to attempts to tax the wealthy to give relief to the middle and lower income brackets. Congress and the President came up with a new way to redistribute wealth with their federal tax plan, which shifts wealth from the taxpayers in high taxed blue states, such as Maryland, to the taxpayers in low taxed red states, such as Mississippi.

Someone who sits in a trailer park in Mississippi, and ordinarily takes the federal standard deduction because they have no itemized deductions, just received a windfall in doubling the federal standard deduction; those of us in Maryland, who ordinarily itemize because we had itemized deductions, just got hit with disaster.

Using the 2014 Personal Statistics of Income (P-SOI 2014) table from the Comptroller's Office for itemized deductions, the average increase in state and local taxes for returns with Maryland Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) of \$150,000 or less would be about \$1,000. This estimate takes into account that they would otherwise be filing returns with the MD standard deduction after 2017. This would affect about one million taxpayers.

By doubling the federal standard deduction and by eliminating many, if not most, of the middle-class tax deductions, such as those on state and local taxes and mortgage interest and college loans and so on, many individuals who didn't take the standard deduction in the past will now take the federal standard deduction. This presents a particular problem for states like Maryland since itemizing on the state return currently requires itemizing on the federal return, since it is directly tied to the federal schedule A.

There are two options to fix this and on February 21, I testified in support of **Senator Serafini's** efforts to both raise the Maryland standard deduction and allow for itemization at the state level even if taking the federal standard deduction.

Obviously raising the state standard deduction is the simplest solution. Pushback is based on lost revenue from those Marylanders who ordinarily took the state standard deduction. We estimate this number to be more than one million Marylanders most of whom fall within the \$25,000 to \$50,000 income range who will benefit on average with an additional \$220.

To that I say: Give Me A Break - a tax break to be more specific. As a high taxed state, giving a tax break is welcomed. The offset of less administrative costs should also be factored into the equation as well as the additional spending to aid the economy and the additional revenue from sales tax from this

spending. All this must be factored into the equation.

The other option is allowing itemizing at the state level regardless of whether you itemize at the federal level. However, this can only be effective if we add back many of the deductions eliminated by the federal tax plan.

HB 875, the **Governor's** bill, and HB 1336, sponsored by **Delegate Anne Kaiser** of District 14, are designed to do just that, as they do several things to undo the problems for Maryland taxpayers caused by the federal tax cut bill. On March 7, I testified in support of both of these bills. Both bills permit Maryland taxpayers to claim itemized deductions whether or not the individual itemizes deductions on the individual's federal income tax return. Second, both bills add back some of the deductions eliminated at the federal level by the federal taxplan.

HB 875, for example, includes in Section 10-108 (a) an overall provision that says that amendments to the federal tax code taking effect on or after December 21, 2017 that affect "the determination of federal adjusted gross income or federal taxable income does not affect the determination of Maryland taxable income..." In the Fiscal Note, there is a statement, "For any amendment that impacts this determination, the State income tax will be 'decoupled' from the federal amendment."

Delegate Kaiser's HB 1336 bill is similar in that it adds back local and state real estate taxes, although it places a limit on incomes of \$150,000 for single filers and \$225,000 for joint filers.

The important message to our legislators during the testimony was that these "losses" in state and local revenue due to these bills are just undoing the tax increases on Maryland taxpayers resulting from the changes in the federal tax cut bill. They are not real losses. We need to fix this problem this year or too many Maryland taxpayers will be seeing large tax increases for 2018.

Further, it was important to remind our legislators that this is neither a Republican issue nor a Democrat issue; this is a Maryland taxpayer issue and politics must be left behind. These bills must be passed on a bipartisan basis to correct the attack on Maryland taxpayers by the current federal government. If these bills are not passed, while the Maryland coffers will be filled, they will be filled on the backs of the Maryland taxpayers, just like the windfall received by that guy in Mississippi.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT


Greetings to all Federation members who enthusiastically embrace our new organizational team title: "Marketing and Member Resources;" we are led at NARFE Headquarters by Staff V.P. **Bridget Boel**. We will, as Active Maryland Federation - "Recruitment/Retention - Go-To-Resources" – continue to provide excellent "Membership Programs and Services" to all current and the many potential new NARFE (National and Chapter) members. Our National NARFE membership closed out 2017 at 208,825 members with increases in October/November/December; at the end of December, 38.6 percent of memberships are National members and 61.4 percent are Chapter members. In the Maryland Federation, there is always a need to emphasize our "Recruitment and Reinstatement" (of non-chapter renewals due to the changes made to the renewal letters from NARFE Headquarters last year), if I may quote our Federation's Membership Retention Chair, Dick Strombotne. Dick also stressed the need to continue all efforts at/on the chapter level to re-invite any/all who transferred out to National Only membership to rejoin the Maryland Federation chapters. Results of "Rejoin Our Chapter Efforts" have been promising in several Maryland Chapters.

One of NARFE'S Strategic Opportunities, as defined in the 2017 Strategic Plan, is "Tough Recruitment Challenges Remain for Membership Growth." Membership Marketing is described in the October 2017 Strategic Plan edition as "Local Face To Face Recruitment" and "representation at state and local high recruitment value events" such as health fairs, state/regional conventions, where prospects are expected to attend.

**POINTS TO REMEMBER: (A) NARFE delivers what current federal employees seek - information and guidance on their benefits; (B) NARFE's Webinars offer excellent reasons to join. They are FREE to members. When you next order printed supplies (F-18 Form), why not think "Membership Recruitment" and order Webinars that would assist in "Engaging your chapter members." This will fulfill your own commitment to "Membership Development." (C) Use NARFE meetings to promote membership. Develop a written Membership Marketing Plan/Strategy and use your Chapter newsletters to promote membership! (See: FH-19 Membership - Marketing Manual, page 9.) (D) Have we all approached our nearest NARFE prospective member(your USPS delivery person) face to face and handed him or her an F-135 Membership Application? Listen to their needs and relate these needs to solutions provided by NARFE benefits! It takes practice, but it does work.

REGION II UPDATE

Happy Spring. May the awakenings this season brings include many renewals and fresh starts for NARFE. The Association's overall membership thankfully continues its significantly lessened decline—a welcomed trend. I am hopeful that we shall soon see an increase in membership. Certainly, today's headlines and proposed legislation and rules should lead every civilian federal worker and retiree to sign up. This would keep our voices strong and relentless with those seeking to trample on what we worked hard to earn. I will repeat what I have said before: NARFE's retention rate is superior. Virtually every other organization of every kind envies our membership re-up rate. While there seems still to be concern that some renewing members are inappropriately dropped from chapter rolls, I earnestly assure you that there is no intention at any level—by anyone—to do this. Any member who feels s/he may have been dropped from a chapter roster must not let that notion fester. Nor can the notion linger that HQ wants to reduce chapter rolls. That concerned member can be immediately restored to or placed into a chapter as soon as HQ is advised to do so. Also, payment of chapter dues can be made directly to the chapter. While HQ has collected such dues for years as a courtesy to chapters, such payments do not have to go to HQ, which will simply reroute them to the chapter. Remember, the choice to be in achapter is for each member to make…no one else. Feel free to remind members of this and to be sure to read the selections available to them on renewal and welcome letters they get.

To improve information sharing, National **President Thissen** recently appointed a six-member **Communications Advisory Committee**. I am honored to be the National Executive Board liaison to this new standing group and was at its January inaugural meeting. Washington State's **Nancy Crosby** is Chair; Pennsylvania's **Maria Ritzman** is a member; and Susan Boswell, Staff VP, Communications, and *narfe Magazine* Editor, Is staff liaison. It is to advise on and support development and implementation of NARFE's digital and traditional publishing, social media programs and other communications activities. It will offer member perspectives on NARFE communications channels, help collect member feedback, and offer input on merits of proposals for new publications as well as sunsetting materials. TREASURER'S REPORT

Federation Finances as of End of 2017.

At the start of 2017, the Maryland Federation's net assets totaled \$89,866. At the end of the year, they totaled \$102,041, for a net annual surplus of \$12,175. The most significant revenues came from ten-percent funds (\$54,983). Chapter per capita assessments were \$4,888.

Ten-percent fund revenues in 2017 were about \$5,700 more than in 2016.

Net Assets. The Federation's net assets as of the end of 2017included: Bank of America (B of A Checking - 44,299.67, B of A Savings - \$81,382.87, B of A CD - \$8,192.52, and the InFirst Federal Credit Union Checking - \$8,166.06. Net assets total \$102,041.12. (InFirst FCU account was closed in January 2018 and assets transferred to B of A Savings).

FEEA UPDATE

FEEA Scholarships

The FEEA/NARFE Annual Scholarship Awards Program started February 2018. This year, there will be only two (2) \$1,000 scholarship winners per region, not six (6) as in past years. Maryland is in Region II. The criteria are for high school seniors with at least a 3.0 Grade Point Average (GPA) on an un-weighted 4.0 scale. The regional judging panels will examine each application, essay and supporting documents. To obtain the official form (F-105, 01/17), send an email to scholarship@narfe.org or call Headquarters at 703-838-7760. Now is the time to start the application process.

The **Essay Question**: What do you consider to be the single most important societal problem in the world today and why? What steps do you believe could begin to address it?

Application must be completed online and postmarked no later than the last Friday in April. Winners will be notified by FEEA and the money will be paid to the college. A list of winners and their sponsors will be posted on the NARFE website and published in the December issue of the *narfe Magazine*. Maryland has had six winners in the last four years. Our children are the future of America!

NARFE BYLAWS AND RESOLUTIONS CORNER

Dues Paid by New Members - A Bylaws Amendment

NARFE Headquarters has issued the book on Proposed Bylaws and Resolutions listing all that were received by December 15, 2017. In particular, it includes Proposal #18-13, which was submitted by Western Montgomery County Chapter 258. Its formal title is: "Reallocate Dues Paid by New Members Who Join a Chapter."

Currently, when a new member joins NARFE, pays the \$40 new membership dues and chooses to join a chapter, HQ sends the member's chapter one-third of the dues, \$13.33, and sends the new member's federation ten percent of the dues, \$4.00. By contrast, if the new member does not elect to join a chapter, NARFE HQ need only remit ten percent, \$4.00, to the member's federation. As you can see, NARFE HQ has no incentive to promote chapter membership.

The purpose of the Proposal #18-13 is to get rid of the difference in allocation of dues of a new member regardless of the election to join or not join a chapter. It would amend the bylaws to have NARFE HQ remit just \$4.00 in either case. If the new member joins a chapter, then the chapter gets the \$4.00 that would normally go to the federation; the normal ten percent of dues paid to the federation is started the following year.

Why is this change needed? The answer is that very few new members choose to join a chapter. The Maryland Federation had only 146 new members in all of 2017; five years earlier, in 2012, there were more than 900 new members. The application form mentions the opportunity to join a chapter in the second column as an afterthought. For NARFE HQ there would no longer be a financial disincentive to promote chapter membership. For chapters, one tenth of something is better than one-third of nothing.

You will have the opportunity to vote on this and all other proposed resolutions this spring. It will be placed on the ballot printed in the June 2018 issue of *NARFE Magazine* that will arrive around mid-May. The deadline for receipt of ballots is June 30, 2018.

Bylaws change Proposal 18-11 removes the confidentiality language protecting your personal data. This proposal, submitted by the National Executive Board (NEB), removes the following language:

All membership and prospective member lists...shall be treated as confidential...Under no circumstances shall the telephone numbers or email addresses of Association members or potential members be provided to anyone other than Association officials and members.

Bylaws change Proposal 18-24 weakens chapter autonomy. Submitted by a National Bylaws and Resolutions Committee member, the Proposal eliminates language that provides chapters the ability to "Establish at the local level a means of direct participation in achieving Association objectives and

goals." The proposal also eliminates some federations' activity language, limiting their scope, and removes the organizational structure and responsibilities language from the Bylaws and places it in the Standing Rules.

The National Bylaws and Resolutions Committee recommended for approval both of these troubling proposals. Overall, the Committee recommended the following:

Adoption of 11 proposals (all submitted by the NEB or the Committee itself with the exception of two, one of which was from a member of the Committee).

Rejection of 13 proposals (the majority submitted by federations and chapters).

No recommendation for 10 proposals (submitted by various individuals or unknown).

Most Committee recommendations and rationale shown in the back of the 2018 Proposed Bylaws and Resolutions booklet do <u>not</u> have full descriptions of the proposals nor adequate reasons given for the recommendations. Note that for Proposal 18-11 (elimination of confidentiality language), discussed above, the Committee simply said, "This is administrative and does not need to be in the rules. The bylaws committee recommends adoption."

Space in the newsletter is too limited to specifically address all the Committee recommendations. Proposal 18-13 is addressed elsewhere in this newsletter, but many other recommendations also require discussion. Please read the actual full proposals with their descriptions in the Booklet (https://www.narfe.org/pdf/Bylaws and Resolutions Book.pdf) and not just the Bylaws and Resolutions Committee's short recommendations. Then, discuss the proposals at chapter meetings and on the NARFE and chapter blogs, on Facebook, etc., make your own decisions, and when the balloting is open, PLEASE VOTE.
